Around us today

Rudransh was 8 years old when a road accident threatened his life.



A dumper truck hit the vehicle that he and his family were travelling in and claimed the life of his mother and uncle. Rudransh was critically injured and was rushed to the hospital by police in an ambulance.

The ambulance was met with a wicked traffic jam on a bridge near the village. The ambulance was stuck for about an hour while Rudransh and his family were helpless without any aid.

After the golden hour had passed, Rudransh was brought to the hospital, only to be pronounced dead.

Can we change this?

Rudransh was 8 years old when a road accident threatened his life.



ALERT's Community First Responder network is notified and a trained lifesaver arrives on scene within a few minutes.

First responder ensures ambulance personnel are informed about victim's position.

Timely first aid was provided to Rudransh in the golden hour, increasing his survival chance by 70%

Mr. V M Muralidharan Chairman - ALERT

What kind of stakeholder partnerships are key to accelerating ALERT's mission of building a sustainable and responsive first-responder network nationwide?

ALERT's mission of 'Right to Life' is like an insurance pie. It is common knowledge that when there is a problem, people need someone to save their lives. But the paradox is, everyone could also think it is not their job. In this context, stakeholders from all walks of life should have a common awareness. That is the simple answer to the question. Stakeholders in this mission ranges from the common man to families to institutions to industries to enforcing agencies to nodal healthcare delivery points and needless to say, to the Government.

Any stakeholder having any access to support social organizations, should be conscious of the fact that a mission such as this, which may not have a visible end beneficiary, like the way it is popularly understood, will need to be supported. There is still a little bit of awareness gap we see here. For example, organizations are more oriented towards probably buying a dialysis machine or possibly supporting economically weaker students in school or college as scholarships or probably giving food packets equating 'giving' to being tangible. But when it comes to creating a volunteer pool with lifesaving skills that could potentially save lives, It is that much harder for the final beneficiary to be visible and therefore it could feel unclear as to what the outcome

When it comes to a common man, the fact of life is that it is easy to say a medical emergency or loss of life can happen to your dear ones. The message still doesn't hit the shore, unfortunately until it is within close range of experience. Real life case studies of lives being saved and testimonials and acknowledgement from such survivors help in creating that impact. Such stories create such an impact where people understand this person would not be talking after that emergency incident, but for that intervention.



Mr. Muralidharan says...

When it comes to the larger systems such as the Government, I would like to see them involved more and more because they should understand that by supporting such a cause, their need in the emergency response eco system can even come down by a considerable percentage. The already strained healthcare systems due to so much demand can be relieved if victims are handled better upstream. For example, the hospital support for a victim in a better life condition, the medication required could be a little less intense to make the victim survive or sometimes if the victim is well revived out of hospital, he will just have to be given a little bit of a comfort medication and sent home. Whereas, if the victim is left unattended for a while and when he is taken to the hospital, the amount of medical intervention required will be more intense, more costly and it is going to occupy beds for longer. And so, it makes total sense to strengthen basic first response and it would be a double whammy when community is encouraged to participate.

In a nutshell, ALERT's mission is exactly similar to how the army is prepared for war while the nation neither wants a war to happen, nor can it be ignored. The mission to save lives borrows that spirit. So, I think every stakeholder irrespective of whether they can contribute with time, talent or treasure, should actually be more aware that investing in enabling the community to be prepared is the first step towards the ability to be resilient in the event of an emergency, whether personal or national.

that life-saving knowledge must reach every citizen, in

I never imagined then, that this mission would grow into a nationwide movement — spanning multiple states, reaching deep into rural and urban India, and touching countless lives.



Ms. Kala says...

Where do you see ALERT in the next 10 years?

Where I stand today, I can clearly foresee ALERT stepping into its next, more evolved avatar. What began as a small NGO with a heartfelt mission is now poised to become a powerful enabler — bringing together the wider emergency response ecosystem, to work with greater alignment, collaboration and impact.

The next 10 years, to me, will be a decade of action. Until now, we have primarily focused on creating awareness and building skills — reaching lakhs of citizens with life-saving knowledge. But the time ahead will be about turning this awareness into real-time action — building a society where help is always within reach when an emergency strikes. I envision communities where trained first responders are everywhere, and where saving lives becomes a natural human response.

In this decade, I see ALERT becoming a forerunner in influencing systemic change, influencing policy, integrating with technology, and building a citizen-led safety culture — one that begins in every household, where emergency preparedness is no longer seen as a choice, but a way of life. A culture where knowing what to do and stepping up to help becomes a second nature.

We may not see the ideal state of this ecosystem fully realized in our lifetimes — but I deeply believe, with the way ALERT is growing, with the commitment of our team, and the support of the system around us, that this is not an impossible dream to pursue. It is a vision we will keep moving towards, one life, one step, one action at a time.

The year bygone has been another strong stepping stone towards the mission of ALERT in building capacity in the community to save lives. With 2024-25 being a bridge year towards ALERT completing 20 years of service in 2026, it is an inflection point in time to look at the question of where India's emergency response ecosystem will be in the next 10 years.

Let's take a moment to look at where was it in 2006 when ALERT was born. In 2006, India did not have an integrated public emergency management system. India did not have a legal framework that protected bystanders if they were to help during emergencies. India did not have this level of wide and deeply penetrated tertiary healthcare set up. India did not have an home grown well researched curriculum if anyone were to learn Basic First Response while it relied only on western recommendations. In many ways, all of this and more necessitated the need for a mission such as the one ALERT has served so far.

India has a centralised emergency management system. India is a medical tourism destination to the entire world. India is known as the world's pharmacy. India has a legal framework for protecting conscious driven bystanders who could be Good Samaritans. India has its own bodies that undertake deep research in generating curriculum in basic first response that is now quickly being adopted by South Asian countries. has national and regional insurance programmes that strengthened Golden Hour care delivery.



Mr. Rajesh says...

Where do you see India's emergency response ecosystem in the next 10 years?

So, what next?

As much as progress has been made, the size of the problem has also grown multi- fold. India is number 2 in road traffic accidents. India is number 2 in sudden cardiac arrest deaths. India is being called the Diabetes capital of the world. Medical emergencies are on the rise taking away 8 to 10% out of final GDP numbers recorded, with people succumbing or becoming unproductive due to lack of timely help.

India needs an overhaul of the basic life support systems to

keep up with the efficiencies of the tertiary healthcare systems. For the population of the size of India, there has to be systemic shifts in the way citizens can access and also participate in the emergency response eco system to save lives. The youth need to have an exposure to gain the "preparedness" mindset before they leave the portals of their educational institutions. India needs an integration of community driven engagements shake hands well with the system driven programmes designed to save lives.

ALERT is at this point of inflection and believes that, with the strength of the inroads made so far, that is reflected in this report, will metamorphize into an orchestrator of such an ideal state in the coming decade. The World Health Organization (WHO)'s invitation to ALERT as a core member of the Acute Care Action Network of India, strengthens the resolve to visualise a country where Community First Response is a Civic Responsibility.










So how do we measure impact?




This survey is analyzed with an impact graph depicting the values before the training as baseline and values after the training as endline. Below are the region wise impact graphs:

The above information is collected and analysed via surveys in states such as Tamilnadu, Gujarat, Uttarakhand, Maharashtra, Punjab and the rest of India.

Willingness

Studying the willingness quotient of the individuals to help an unknown person in a medical emergency situation. The survey results throws light on the empathy quotient in people and the any inhibitions that different sets of audiences might have.

Awareness

Studying the level of awareness on the legal, judicial support systems, and awareness on the basic do's and don'ts in an emergency situation.

Knowledge


Studying the knowledge and skill the audience have, to handle selected common medical emergencies. This metric indicates the extent of empowerment in a participant to respond in an informed and efficient manner during emergencies.

VolCE in action



"In Guindy Railway Station, a person was seen on the track and had sustained severe injuries. Along with others, I jumped onto the track and went near to the victim and saw that he had vitals. With the help of others, I moved the victim to the platform. Despite the overwhelming scene, I saw that one of his legs was amputed. I quickly removed the clothes of the victim, tied the victim's leg with his shirt and with my own shawl tied the victim's head to control the bleeding. I also saw that the victims nose was bleeding and I tried to arrest that too with others help.

I followed the basic life support steps, checked for vitals, and noticed that it was intact. As soon as ambulance reached the location, I explained what happened to the victim and he was taken to the hospital.

In April 2024, near Aliyar, I saved a young man by performing CPR at the right time. The guy lost consciousness after drowning in the river. With the help of my friends, I rescued him and brought him back to life by performing CPR. Thanks to ALERT for teaching me CPR at the AGA Fest held on January 8th, 2024.

I found a person lying down with no consciousness. I started BLS and I discovered that he had no pulse or breathing. At that moment I started to give CPR. The victim got his breath with a gastric sound within the 1st cycle of CPR. I wholeheartedly thank the ALERT NGO for giving me that sole satisfaction.

My grandfather was eating food when he choked and lost consciousness. I performed the Heimlich maneuver, which dislodged the food particle and allowed him to breathe again. He regained consciousness shortly afterward. Everyone in the family was tense, but my first-aid knowledge gave me the confidence to act and save my grandfather. This was my first time performing the maneuver, and I successfully did it.


Chennai Green Corridor Project

As a step towards reducing fatalities owing to delay in reaching medical care, this project set out to establish green corridors for ambulances, making Chennai's roads Ambulance friendly. This project was powered by msiren by Small Acts Technologies with the support of MS Chola Insurance.

A National First: 108 Meets Community First Response



A system level intervention

In a step to enable a robust emergency response ecosystem, the ALERT Helpdesk was launched in Puducherry in collaboration with the Puducherry Government Health Department and supported by our CSR partners EATON.

Puducherry becomes the first region in India where the Government's EMS (Emergency Management System) includes a formal process of triggering a community first responder in tandem with the call to 108, ensuring the victim receives immediate first aid along with hospital admission. This process will be routed via the ALERT Helpdesk, a crucial milestone in our mission of saving lives.

The Help Desk was inaugurated by Dr. V. Ravichandran, Director of Health, Puducherry Government in the presence of Praveen Kumar Thirupathi, Senior S.P., Puducherry Transport, S.P., Mr. Maran and S.P., Mr. Ranganathan, S.P., Mr. Selvam.







"Today, I witnessed an unfortunate accident at Vilankurichi road involving an elderly man who suffered a severe leg fracture (literally broken into two) when a car ran over his leg.

I immediately parked my vehicle aside and rushed towards the victim. Realizing his leg was fractured, I ensured he stayed still and used my bag to support his leg. I also asked a bystander from the crowd to stand behind him so that he can lean and sit comfortably. I also called an ambulance immediately through my phone, got some ice from a nearby bakery to reduce the swelling on his leg and ensured he remained calm and comfortable by giving him some water.

Thankfully, the ambulance arrived in 5 minutes. The medical team provided first aid, stabilized his leg with a splint, checked his vitals, and transported him to the nearest government hospital.

This incident left me with a deep sense of gratitude and a reminder of the importance of helping others in moments of need. Thank you for equipping me with the right kind of knowledge about emergency response.

To control the bleeding from his knee, we used a dry cloth, tied it tightly, and lifted it above heart level. However, we could not control the bleeding from his mouth as we did not have any other resources. We then received support from an auto driver and immediately shifted him to the hospital.

- Expanding preventive and interventional impact


